Sculpture & Cave Art

- ◆ **Sarnath & Mathura:** Flourishing schools of sculpture, refining Buddhist and Hindu iconography.



Temple Architecture

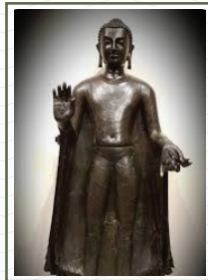
- ◆ **Emergence of the Nagara Style:** Characterized by curvilinear shikharas (spires).

 - **Bhitargaon Temple:** A significant brick temple showcasing refined Gupta architectural style.

- ◆ **Charaka-Charaka Samhitas:** Pioneered in **Ayurvedic medicine**.



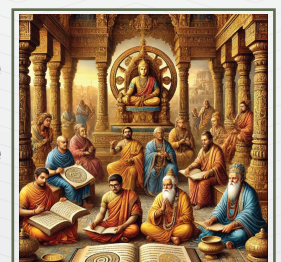
Religious & Philosophical Texts

Nine Gems (Navaratnas) in the Court of Chandragupta II

Chandragupta II (Vikramaditya) patronized nine eminent scholars, known as the **Navaratnas (Nine Gems)**, who made significant contributions to various fields of knowledge.



Name	Field	Contributions
Amarasimha	Lexicography & Grammar	Author of Amarakosha, a key Sanskrit thesaurus.
Dhanvantari	Medicine & Ayurveda	Pioneer of Ayurveda; advanced medical science and herbal treatments.
Harisena	Poetry & Court Chronicle	Composer of the Allahabad Pillar Inscription of Samudragupta.
Kalidasa	Sanskrit Literature & Drama	Renowned poet and playwright, works include Abhijnanashakuntalam, Meghadutam, Raghuvamsam, Kumarasambhavam.
Kahapanaka	Astrology & Numerology	Expert in astrology, predicting royal events and celestial phenomena.
Shanku	Architecture & Engineering	Contributed to temple architecture and urban planning.
Varahamihira	Astronomy & Astrology	Author of Panchasiddhantika, integrating Indian, Greek, and Roman astronomy.
Vararuchi	Grammar & Linguistics	Contributed to Sanskrit grammar, associated with Prakrit Paingala
Vetalabhata	Ritualistic Sciences & Magic	Expert in Tantra and rituals, influencing religious practices.

Coinage of the Gupta Empire

Gupta rulers issued some of the finest **gold, silver, and copper coins**, reflecting their wealth and artistic excellence.



Types of Coins:

- **Gold Coins (Dinars):** Featured images of kings in dynamic poses (archer, horse-man, lion-slayer types).
- **Silver Coins:** Mainly issued by later rulers, depicting religious symbols.
- **Copper Coins:** Used for daily transactions, featuring Garuda and other Hindu motifs.

Notable Features:

- Highly refined inscriptions and detailed engravings.
- Representations of **deities like Lakshmi, Vishnu, and Kartikeya**.
- Commemorative coins highlighting military victories and religious patronage.

Decline of the Gupta Empire

The Gupta Empire began to weaken towards the late 5th and early 6th centuries CE due to a combination of **external invasions, internal weaknesses, and economic decline**.

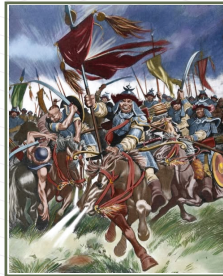


Key Factors Behind the Decline

1. Huna Invasions:

- ◆ The **Hunas (Huns)** from Central Asia launched repeated invasions.

Skandagupta initially repelled them, but his successors failed to contain their expansion.



- ◆ The Hunas, skilled in cavalry warfare and archery, overran **Gandhara, Punjab, Gujarat, and Malwa**, fragmenting the empire.

2. Political & Administrative Weaknesses:

- ◆ The **Guptas allowed local chiefs** to retain authority after conquest, weakening central control.
- ◆ Frequent **succession disputes** and weak rulers led to internal instability.
- ◆ Rising **feudatories** (regional governors) declared independence, further eroding Gupta power.

3. Economic Decline:

- ◆ **Land grants** to religious institutions reduced state revenue, weakening the military.
- ◆ **Decline in trade** due to setbacks in western India and disruption of Mediterranean connections.
- ◆ **Silk weavers migrated from Gujarat to Malwa (473 CE)** due to reduced demand, signaling economic distress.
- ◆ **Debasement of Gupta gold coins** indicated financial instability.



4. Neglect of Military & Foreign Pressures:

- ◆ The Guptas **shifted focus from military conquests** to religious and cultural pursuits.
- ◆ Internal **dynastic conflicts** further weakened centralized power.
- ◆ **Skandagupta's excessive spending** on defense drained the empire's resources.

Conclusion

The **Gupta Empire** set the stage for India's **classical cultural identity**, excelling in **art, architecture, literature, science, and coinage**. This period not only **preserved and refined earlier traditions** but also **laid the foundation for future developments** in Indian and global history.
